Geological Survey / U.S. Department of Interior Supporting Geological Mapping

PROGRAM: The purpose of the Geological Survey, a component of the National Cooperative Geologic Mapping Program (NCGMP) is to train the next generation of geologic mappers. The NCGMP will provide funds for graduate and selected undergraduate students in academic research projects that involve geologic mapping as a major component. Through these agreements, NCGMP hopes to expand the research and educational capacity of academic programs that teach earth science students the techniques of geologic mapping and field data analysis.

DEADLINE: November 19, 2004.

FUNDING: Total amount of \$483,872 for 61 awards.

ELIGIBILITY: Public and private higher education institutions with geology departments or programs.

Nuclear Physics Research / U.S. Department of Energy Researching Nuclear Physics

PROGRAM: The Nuclear Physics program supports basic research, technical developments and world-class accelerator facilities to expand our fundamental understanding of the interactions and structures of atomic nuclei and nuclear matter, and an understanding of the forces of nature as manifested in nuclear matter.

DEADLINE: November 1, 2004.

FUNDING: \$70 million total in fiscal 2005, including up to 30 percent for new awards.

ELIGIBILITY: Colleges, universities and other research organizations.

Technological Innovation and Cooperation for Foreign Information Access / U. S. Department of Education

Sharing Technological Information

PROGRAM: The Technological Innovation and Cooperation for Foreign Information Access (TICFIA) Program strives to support projects that will develop innovative techniques or programs using new electronic technologies to collect information from foreign sources. Grants will be made to access, collect, organize, preserve, and widely disseminate information on world regions and countries other than the United States that address our Nation's teaching and research needs in international education and foreign languages. (CFDA #84.337A)

DEADLINE: November 17, 2004.

FUNDING: \$1.7 million for awards of \$100,000 to \$200,000 a year each, for up to four years.

ELIGIBILITY: Higher education institutions, public and nonprofit libraries and consortia of libraries.

Attract and Retain Accomplished Teachers in Hard to Staff Public Schools / National Education Association (NEA) Keeping Accomplished Teachers

PROGRAM: The Attract and Retain Accomplished Teachers Program is designed to help hard-to-staff schools attract teachers. They seek teachers who are eager to lead efforts to meet challenges and have the expertise to help transform schools characterized by achievement gaps, poverty, and low expectations. Research confirms that accomplished teachers, such as

National Board Certified Teachers, who teach in their area of academic specialty are essential for improving student achievement in hard-to-staff schools. Unfortunately, some schools are not able to attract and retain such accomplished teachers. Of the 32,000 teachers certified by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards, relatively few work in the nation's needlest schools.

DEADLINE: November 1, 2004. The grant period is 18 months, beginning March 1, 2005.

FUNDING: Three to six grants of \$50,000 to \$100,000 will be awarded.

ELIGIBILITY: Eligibility is limited to partnerships comprising NEA state affiliates, one or more local NEA affiliates, and one or more public school districts. Eligible partnerships may engage other organizations deemed necessary to accomplish the goal of the grant.
